Recycle and dispose

Keep unwanted household chemicals out of the watershed by disposing them properly. Check with your town or city.



Know your bald eagles

10-14 lbs

Average adult weight

Average lifespan of a wild bald eagle



Bald eagle nests are 5-8 feet wide and 6 feet deep, and are among the largest structures in the bird world.



Eagles fly with their wings held flat, **like a plank**. An eagle can fly faster or slower by changing the position of its wings.



Once paired, bald eagles remain together for life.









Spotting tips



Eagles live primarily **along both U.S. coasts** and on major lakes, rivers and reservoir systems.




They usually eat fish, but will also feed on waterfowl, small mammals and carrion.



Bald eagles are **protected by federal laws** such as the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act and the Migratory Bird Treaty Act.

- Patience is the key to successful spotting. Scan the trees for perching birds, which can look baseball-sized.
- Avoid disturbing eagles with noises or by getting close. Leave pets at home.
- It is illegal to pursue, harm, harass, take or attempt to take, possess, sell, purchase or transport eagles, eagle parts or their eggs. These actions are a federal and NYS offense and carry stiff penalties and/or jail time.



Viewing sites

Sites highlighted in **blue** feature a warming tent and an educator with a scope.

- 1. Bronx: Wave Hill Saw Mill River Parkway S to exit 22, 245th St. Left at stop sign. Left at light on Riverdale Ave/ Henry Hudson Pkwy service road. Right at 249th St.
- 2. Yonkers: Beczak
 Environmental Education
 Center Saw Mill River Pkwy
 S to Exit 5 (Yonkers Ave W).
 Right at light at end of exit
 ramp. Stay in right lane, follow
 to Ashburton Ave. Continue
 to end, left onto Alexander St.
 Beczak on right.
- 3. Sleepy Hollow: Kathryn W. Davis Riverwalk Center Rte 9N, Sleepy Hollow. Left onto Palmer Ave, and follow to end. Cross railroad tracks. Left into Kingsland Point Park.
- 4. Sleepy Hollow: Rockwood Hall Rte 9N from Tappan Zee Bridge, approximately 3.5 miles. Turn right onto Rte 117 heading east. Park is approximately 1 mile on the right.
- 5. Croton: Echo Canoe Launch (boat ramp) at Croton-Harmon Train Station (south end) Rte 9N to Croton-Harmon exit, turn left. Left into train station to end of parking lot to boat ramp. Sponsored by Saw Mill River Audubon.
- ★ 6. EagleFest HQ at Croton-Point Park Rte 9N to Croton-Harmon exit, turn left. Straight over train yard.
- 7. Croton: Van Cortlandt Manor Rte 9N to Croton-Harmon exit, turn right. Right at light, to end of road.
- 8. Cortlandt: Oscawana Island Park Rte 9N to Montrose exit. Right onto Rte 9A South. First right to Furnace Dock Rd to river.
- 9. Croton: New Croton Dam (Directions from Croton Point Park). From Croton Point Avenue, left onto S. Riverside Ave. Slight right onto Maple St. Continue on Rte 129E. Park on right. Sponsored by Bedford Audubon.
- 10. Montrose: George's Island Park Rte 9N to Montrose exit. Left on Rte 9A North. Left on Dutch St. Follow to end. Sponsored by Saw Mill River Audubon.

- 11. Verplanck: Steamboat Riverfront Park (Directions from Charles Point Park.) Right onto John Walsh Blvd, becomes Broadway. Follow to end. Sponsored by Town of Cortlandt.
- **12. Peekskill: Charles Point Park** Rte 9N to Charles Point exit. Left onto Louisa St. Straight, park on right.
- **13. Peekskill: Riverfront Green** Rte 9N to Hudson Ave. Left. Cross train tracks. Sponsored by The City of Peekskill.
- **14. Cortlandt: Annsville Creek Paddlesports Center** Rte 9N to Annsville Circle at Rte 6/202 junction.
- **15. Cortlandt: Iona Island Overlook** Rte 9N to Annsville
 Circle. Left to Rte 6/202 (Bear
 Mountain Bridge Rd.) Park in
 overlook lot.
- 16. Cold Spring: Constitution Marsh Audubon Center and Sanctuary Left off Rte 9D after bridge onto Beverly Warren Rd. At T, left on Indian Brook Rd. At next T, turn right.
- 17. Garrison: Boscobel House and Gardens Rte 9N. Continue straight through traffic circle to stay on Rte 9N. Left onto Rte 403 North. Right onto Rte 9D North. Viewing station is approximately 2.7 miles on left.
- **18. Cornwall: Kowawese Unique Area** Plum Point Lane,
 Rte 9W North, right onto Plum
 Point Lane near the sign for
 Plum Point Park. Go to end.
- **19. West Point: Boat Dock** Rte 9W North to Rte 218.
- 20. Bear Mountain State Park: Trailside Museums and Zoo

Rte 9W, south of Bear Mt. Circle. Enter Bear Mountain State Park. \$8 parking fee waived with EagleFest map. Walk, following signs to Trailside Museums. Viewing station behind History Museum.

- **21. Jones Point at Tompkins Cove** Rte 9W, 3.3 miles south of Bear Mountain Circle. Left at Jones Point, right at River Rd.
- **22. Stony Point** Rte 9W, south of Bear Mountain Circle. Left on E. Main St, proceed to river.
- **23. Piermont Pier** Rte 9W, south of Tappan Zee Bridge.
